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OPINION: MOBILE PHONE SCANNING OPTIONS



Last year, we shared a page describing some of the options available when trying to <u>use</u> <u>your phone as a scanner</u>. At the time, one of our favorite scanning apps was CamScanner. We must admit, however, that the watermarks and advertisements for the subscription options in CamScanner started to annoy us. So we took another look at the other options we had mentioned, and the new favorite is Adobe Scan (despite our misgivings about Adobe's price structure for other services).

For both apps, installation is easy. If you are concerned about the amount of space available for your scans, the free version of CamScanner offers 200MB, while a free Adobe Document Cloud account (which Adobe Scan uses) offers 2GB of storage. What about the quality of the scans, and how easy it is to capture them? The apps are about equal performance-wise on a slightly older Android phone; the quality of your device's camera is going to have a bigger impact on your scan quality than the apps themselves. The option to scan multiple pages into one file can help save time, and that is available in both apps. Adobe Scan has a useful auto-capture feature that will snap the photo once it finds the edges of the page. We have not found a similar option in the free CamScanner app.

Sharing files is slightly easier from the Adobe Scan app, though it is not difficult to save to Google Drive or email the scan from either app (among other sharing options). What it really comes down to, though, is being able to use an app that does not pop up advertisements or add its company watermark to your scans. For this reason, Adobe Scan takes home our new mobile scanning app of the month award.
